“New Year’s Greeting”

Greetings and Happy New Year! Along with my family, we are happy to be able to start this new year together with our newly found friends at the temple. Thank you for this past year and we look forward to listening to the Buddha Dharma with you again this year. My wife Kaori and son Keisai, who will be three this year, arrived in America last year in May. I was very happy that they were able to come to America despite the tumultuous situation with our current administration and its current immigration policy. We are glad that everything went well in the

end.

Now that we have been living together as a family again, I see that my son picks up many of his parents' mannerisms, especially me. This particularly frightens me, in a humorous way. For example, when I speak to my wife, I try to use Japanese exclusively because I do not want to lose the ability to speak the language. But there are times when I don't know how to say something in Japanese so I will mix Japanese and English. My son hears this and I can tell when he mixes Japanese and English as well. I flex in front of the mirror many times. My son sees this and tries to do that as well. There is a phrase that I say in jest that I actually probably took from my father and it's said, "an-da-sutando denki-sutando"? (Understand *denki* (Japanese for light) stand?) The phrase is complete gibberish but it rolls off the tongue and Keisai tries to copy this too. I guess the apple does not fall far from the tree after all... this makes me especially worried when I think about my situation with my father.

Recently, I saw a commercial by the insurance company Progressive about how a person grows up to become like their dad and starts to say dad-like things. Phrases like, "I refer to every child as 'chief' now," or "The best defense is the best offense," or "Why would I replace my phone with a new one? It's not broken," are good

examples. These commercials depict how I feel from time to time, which is that I feel like I'm turning into my dad. I once remember my father saying he could not find his glasses, but they were on his head the whole time. I am bound to be like this someday, and Keisai will be the one who will then roll his eyes at me.

As with any parent, I want the best for my child. As such, I want him to be the ideal me, not the real me. I try my best to keep my thoughts, actions, and words controlled, collected, and appropriate for my child just like how the "Golden Chain" recommends. But no matter how much I tell myself that I need to watch and do what I say in front of my child, my true self will come out whether I like it or not. No matter how much I try to control my actions or my emotions, there will always be a limit as to what I can keep from him. More broadly, no matter how much I may try to "clean" myself up, purify my deluded self and attachments, or extinguish all the things that I think are bad about myself, I will always fail to meet up to my own high expectations of my ideal self.

This is where Amida Buddha's compassion becomes very important. With Amida Buddha, there is no condition or requirement that I have to match in order to be accepted. The goal in Shin Buddhism is not to make oneself attain a special higher state of being or to try and extinguish all blind passions. Instead, the goal is to awaken to the understanding that although I may fall at times, there is the ground of Amida's compassion that is always there to catch me. It is the net that catches the acrobat when he misses the swinging bar; it is the light that comes on when walking in a dark unknown room; it is the mirror that reflects my true naked self. In Shin, there is no condition on our part to meet, there is only the awakening to the understanding that we are all embraced in infinite compassion.

「新年のご挨拶」

新年あけましておめでとうございます。去年は大変お世話になりました。今年も皆様と一緒に仏法を聴聞させていたきたいと思ひます。妻(香織)と子供(慶哉、今年で3歳になります)は去年の5月にアメリカに着きました。現在、アメリカ大統領の移民制度の厳しい状況の中、二人が無事にアメリカに渡れたことにほっとしています。

家族と再び一緒に住むことになってから、息子が色々両親の真似をすることがあると感じます。特にお父さんの真似をするのですが、これを見て私は彼の将来のことを心配します。例えば、私が妻と話をしている時、私は練習のために出来るだけ日本語で喋ります。しかし、日本語で何かを表現できない場合、日本語と英語を混ぜます。息子がこれ見て聞いて同じく両語を使うことがあります。また、鏡の前でいろんなポーズをとって自分の姿をじっくりと見ることもあります。そして息子がそれを見て真似をします。私は面白がって「アンダースタンド、電気スタンド？」と言うと、息子もそのセリフを真似します。カエルの子はカエルと言いますが、このことをよく考えてみますと、私と私の父親はどれだけ似てるのでしょうか？すごく不安になります....ある時に、父が「おい、わしのメガネを知らないか」ときいたことがあります。私はすぐに「頭の上にあるやん！」と答えたことがありました。こんなふうにつか私もこうなり、そして我が子が自分に対して怒るんだなと思ひました。

どの親でも自分の子がちゃんと育ってほしいと思うでしょう。そのため、現実の自分よりも、理想的な「自分」を真似して育ってほしいのです。私の身(体の行動)・口(話す言葉)・意(考える思い)全

てを子供の前ではうまくコントロールしたいと思ひます。しかし、いくら頑張つて自分のする行動を抑えてみても、どこがで知らない内に自分の本音が出ています。同じように自分の心をいくら磨こうとしても、清浄にしようとしても、そして煩惱を消滅しようとしても、やはり無理があるようです。

ここで阿弥陀如来のお慈悲が大切になってくるのであります。阿弥陀如来は我々に何かの条件を与え、そして私たちがそれに応えたら救ってくださるというではありません。浄土真宗では、我々は修行をして心を磨き、よりよい人間になることではありません。また煩惱というものを消滅することも目的ではありません。むしろ、ゴールがあるとしたら、それは自分が転んでも受け取ってくれる地面がある、つまり私のために阿弥陀如来のお慈悲があるのだと気づくのだということであります。まるでアクロバットの人が失敗して落ちてしまった時に、その人を救ってくれる網が下にあるようなものです。これが阿弥陀如来のお慈悲であります。また、暗い部屋に入った時にスイッチをつけて明るくするようなものであります。あるいは、自分の本当の姿を写して下さる鏡のようなものであります。浄土真宗では、私が何かの条件を満たして救われていくのではなく、一切のものがお慈悲に抱かれているということに気づくのがその目的であります。

今年一年皆様と共々にこの阿弥陀様のお慈悲を聴聞させていただきたいと思ひます。よろしくお願ひします。合掌。




