Happy June everyone! I sincerely hope that you all are doing well and keeping cool during this warm summer weather! June is a time that we all begin to relax a little bit. For students, they go on summer vacation. For adults, it's also a time for vacation and travel, maybe a wedding! How are we going to spend our summer vacation? I think for temples, we still stay busy. While some temples go on a bit of a break in terms of Dharma School and Sunday services, this is the

While we can all use breaks, and we should try our best to balance our time between leisure and work, I would like to highlight our mother temple's hard work and efforts to spread the teaching of Jodo Shinshu throughout the world. At first this might seem unreasonable, but thankfully, Nishi Hongwanji has many staff members who can cover for each other and ensure that there will always be services every day.

This, to me, reflects the everlasting working and direction of merit that is given to us by Amida Buddha. Amida Buddha never took a holiday and never took a vacation to reach the perfect enlightenment. This was purely for our benefit. Wisdom and compassion reaches us on a daily basis because of this non-ceasing working.

This does not mean that I advocate that we should not take breaks. All of us, including myself, need to take vacations and decompress from the everyday stresses of life. Otherwise, we lead an unhealthy and unbalanced life. However, we should also remember that we can relax, and we can sometimes take it easy, because the nembutsu is still working constantly for our benefit. We often hear ministers say we live a life of gratitude and one of the main reasons for that gratitude is Amida's never ending wisdom and compassion.

Buddhist Education Committee News



Out in New Tacoma Cemetery, there is a headstone dedicated to the "**muen**", meaning people without known families. Tacoma Buddhist Temple laid this marker in 1978. Whenever I see it, I am struck by the care that this temple showed toward people whose connection to the temple were unclear, or even non-existent.



According to the Dharma, none of us is truly an independent creation, we are nothing without all the causes that came together to make us. The material of our bodies comes from the food we eat and the air we breathe. Our ideas and our habits come from our schooling and education,

the influence of our friends, and our experiences in life. We are especially the product of the elders who raised us. And those elders only exist because of *their* elders. Just as we were created by our ancestors, so too was the Tacoma Buddhist Temple. Some of today's members are blood descendants of the temple's original founders, but most of us are not. And not all of us are Japanese American, even though this remains an essential part of our temple culture. We are a community of Buddhists.

There are many Buddhist communities in Tacoma, but our temple is a very special place to encounter the Dharma. Some of the Buddhist communities in our area are very small and focus on activities that can be challenging for families to participate in, like meditation. There are several large and vibrant communities in the South Sound, but in most of these much of the socializing and ritual occurs in languages other than English. Our temple is good for families, and more importantly it is a place where one can encounter a Dharma teaching that is applicable in everyday life, not just on a mountaintop or in solitary meditation.

Tacoma Buddhist Temple is a special place, and for this we should give thanks to the temple's ancestors. This is a perfect season to reflect on our temple ancestors. On July 12, we will head out to the Eatonville and Orting cemeteries to show our respect to Japanese American pioneers through cleaning and chanting. Then, after service on July 16, Sensei and others will travel to four cemeteries in Tacoma and Sumner to honor past members of the temple and other loved ones. If you have never attended any of these, the BEC encourages everyone to consider coming out, to stand beside the living descendants of these past elders, our own temple ancestors.
