It was part of the monks' ritual to travel from town to town to beg for food. Originally, monks were not supposed to farm or cook their meals. They had to rely on lay people for their meals. While in many countries you may see lay people bowing down to monks in a sense of deep reverence, it should not be forgotten that they too play a part in the monks' path to enlightenment. The Buddha himself also relied upon the laypeople for food.

This illustrates the importance of the sangha as a whole. Yes, Buddhist priests and monks should be seen as guides and teachers of the Dharma, but the importance of the lay community and their dedication to the teachings should not be overshadowed either.

Amida Buddha, the Buddha of infinite light and life, saves all sentient beings, and leaves none behind. To borrow a sentiment from Shinran's teaching, whether you are a monk, or lay, wealthy, or not, and regardless of your gender identity. Amida embraces us all and constantly sends wisdom and compassion our way.

As we continue to move forward as a Sangha, let us all remember how we each play a vital role in preserving the teachings, and traditions of our predecessors.


