Happy October everyone! I would first like to congratulate and thank all the members of the Tacoma Buddhist Temple for their hard work in hosting our annual Northwest Convention! This was my first, fully in-person convention and I had a blast. It was very nice to see my uncle, Rev. Dean Koyama, and my Auntie Linda. They wish to send their regards and thanks to you all as well. I know they enjoyed themselves immensely being back up in Washington.

I know everyone is beginning to notice that the days are becoming shorter and that the temperatures are starting to drop. We are now feeling the fall season upon us! This means falling leaves, Halloween, school being back in session for college, and the end of the year in sight!

The theme for this year's dharma school is the *Cycles of Life*. We notice that we cycle through the year with routines and rituals for every season. The clothes we wear, the activities we participate in, even the types of food we eat. In the winter we eat stews, soups, and heartier foods. In the summer we eat colder dishes, lighter food, and more liquids to keep ourselves hydrated.

We also have the daily routines and rituals that we do even without thinking. Maybe you always have breakfast at a certain time? Do you get out of bed by a certain time? Perhaps you go on an exercise regimen certain times of the day or certain days of the week. My father, for example, has to get his morning run, or bicycle ride in every morning! Sometimes his rigidly sticking to this routine drives my mother crazy. For most of you too, every Sunday you come to the temple.

I love that at temple we also have cycles we go through as well. Every year we plan for our big events like Hoonko, Ohigan, Hanamatsuri, Obon, Bazaar, etc. As we begin each new month, we kind of predict or prepare for the events we know are in store for us. How wonderful it is to be part of a temple community who continues to move through the year and nurture the sangha all along the way.

Yes, it is possible to change routines and to alter our schedules, but the sun will still go down at night and rise in the morning. The days will continue to progress as well as the years. For us, the numbers and days will not

cease. Yet at the same time, the same can be said for Amida's light. Amida Buddha is the Buddha of infinite light and life. As the cycles never cease to end, neither will the working of the Dharma. The Dharma wheel will continue to turn and spread wisdom and compassion for all.

Thank you to everyone who helped make this year's 76th NW District Buddhist Convention a success. If you were present at Saturday's opening service, you may find some of this information familiar, but I believe it's worth sharing one of the remarkable ideas presented by our keynote speaker, Rev. Dean Koyama.



Rev. Koyama drew our attention to a seemingly simple but profound concept connected to the iconic character, Hello Kitty, created by Yuko Shimizu. Hello Kitty, as you may or may not know, is consistently depicted without a mouth. This deliberate design choice allows you, the viewers to project their own emotions onto Hello Kitty. When you're happy, it appears as though Hello Kitty is sharing in your happiness. Conversely, during moments of sadness, Hello Kitty seems to empathize with your feelings.

Now, how does this relate to Buddhism? I encourage you, with permission from the minister, to take a closer look at Amida Buddha the next time you visit the temple. You'll notice that Amida Buddha also has a serene, mutual expression. This design makes it easier for us to project our own emotions onto Amida Buddha. During moments of joy, Amida Buddha appears to celebrate with us, and in times of sorrow, he stands as a symbol of comfort and understanding.

While I've touched upon this idea briefly, Rev. Dean Koyama's keynote speech was filled with many other insightful details. Once again, a heartfelt thank you to Rev. Dean Koyama for delivering a thought-provoking keynote.

ACCEPTED JAPANESE ITEMS

Japanese Art: Scrolls, ukiyo-e prints, paintings, drawings, calligraphy, screens, posters.

Japanese Books: Cookbooks only.

Japanese Clothing and Dance Accessories: Happi coat, kimono, obi, kanzashi, geta, zori, haori, hakama, yukata, Japanese handbags, tabi, kimono under garments, ties and sashes. Uchiwa, tenugui, sensu (folding fan), castanets, kasa (Japanese umbrella).

Japanese Kitchen & Cooking Items: Rice cookers (shamaji), mochi machines, donabe (hot pot), sushi molds.

Japanese Musical Instruments: hakuhashi, koto, taiko drums.

Obutsudan and accessories: Family-owned altar, small to mid-sized that is easily transportable.

Japanese Tablewares: chawan, teapots, tea sets, sake sets, Japanese dishes, ceramics, miso bowls, dishes, plates and platters.

Japanese Textiles: kimono material, furoshiki and other Japanese made fabrics, table clothes and placemats.

Japanese Toys: kendama, tako (kites), hagoita, koma (tops), shogi, Go, hanafuda (card game).

Items we will NOT accept:

Appliances (home equipment) – e.g. Refrigerators, dishwashers, washing machines, etc.

Beauty Products (cosmetics) – e.g. perfume, shampoo, soaps

Bed Parts – e.g. mattresses or frames

Clothes – shoes, jackets, purses, pants, etc.

Non-Japanese Books and Records – Encyclopedias, magazines, newspapers, albums, history books, etc.

Electronics – e.g. cameras, laptops, televisions, stereos, peripheral equipment

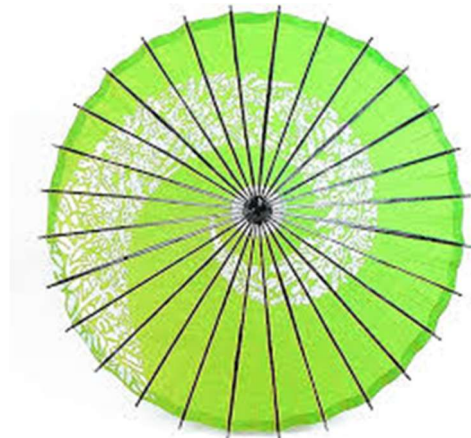
Furniture – e.g. couches, tables, office furniture, lamps, shelves, night stands, chairs, empty picture frames, rugs, etc.

Japanese American Historical Items – e.g. camp furniture, camp jewelry, immigration documentation

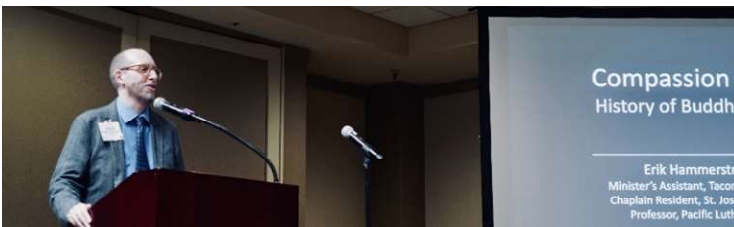
Office Supplies – e.g. binders, paper, pencils, folders (unique Japanese items accepted)
