### Sensei's Message

A Rough Start To 2021

Hello everyone! Wow what a way the year has started. January was definitely a turbulent month to say the least. In the first month of 2021, we have seen political unrest as we watched in horror as seditionists sieged the United States Capitol building. The Coronavirus is still running rampant throughout the United States and has taken more lives. It seems like we just can't catch a break!

During this time, more and more people seem to desire coming to temple or their

respective places of worship to somehow make sense of all of the chaos we have seen in the past few months. The irony being of course is that we are now restricted from coming to the place we probably want to go to the most. While I am eagerly waiting to be able to open the temple doors again and to pack the temple pews, your health and safety are still my top priority. This means we have to hold off from coming back to the temple a little while longer.

While vaccines are slowly being distributed, we still have to do our part in making sure that we act as safely as possible in order to help quell this virus. To put it bluntly, we have had a rough beginning of the year, 2021.

I am not going to lie; I along with all of you have shared feelings of anger and frustration over these past few weeks. I can't help but think of the times of Shinran and how he was also born into a world of strife. All of the suffering he must have witnessed during his childhood and during his days in Kyoto. During these times it is important we turn our attention back to our teachings of Jodo Shinshu. It is important that we remember that we all are bonbu beings drowning in our own egos and harshly judging the world for what it should be!

With that being said, we also turn to the teachings as a source of inspiration of how to conduct ourselves in society. Our teachings turn us to truth, not to be understood in a manner that places us above the human condition, but to guide us in how we can best live our own lives but to also help those around us as well. Our teachings are never meant to be used as tools of strife, apathy, or hedonism. Shinran also condemned such thinking.

When we turn our thoughts to the thought of Namo Amida Butsu, it isn't a call for us to just be lazy and act in self-serving manners because Amida universally accepts all beings to the pure land. It is an indication that we put all of our trust into the working of Amida's Wisdom and Compassion. As we reflect on this, I ask that we also heavily consider that we take the lessons we have learned from our previous teachers and Shinran himself and deeply think as to how to apply it in our daily lives.

We have seen a lot of strife and unrest at the beginning of this year. Some of us are starting to assume that this year is going to be just as bad as the last one. However, that largely depends on all of us and how we are able to interact with one another. Will we continue the pattern of division and violence? Or will we come together as a nation in a peaceful way? The scary thing is that I do not know what the future holds. All I know is that no matter what happens, no matter what the fate of this nation will be, Amida will always still embrace me.

### **Young Buddhist Association News**



### **Buddhist Education Committee News**



In the *Contemplation Sutra*, the Buddha instructs Ānanda and Queen Vaidehī to imagine that they are in the Pure Land, telling them to "…see buddhas and bodhisattvas filling the sky and hear the sounds of the water, birds, and trees, and the voices of the buddhas all expounding the wonderful Dharma in accord with the twelve divisions of the scriptures." While the events of the last year, and certainly of the last month, have shown us that

we are not living in a Pure Land, we can nevertheless hear the Dharma speaking to us in our daily lives if we pause to listen. Monpō 聞法 (もんぽう), which means "listening to the Dharma" is one of our key practices as Shin Buddhists. Just as in this passage, the truth is always speaking out to us: in the rustle of leaves, in the sound of a car going by, and in the cries of migrating birds.

One of the easiest ways to hear the Dharma is at temple during Sensei's message. Since arriving in Tacoma, Rev. Koyama has adapted to our pandemic world by releasing services on our YouTube channel every week. The BEC, which supports Sensei, is working with him on other ways for you to hear to Dharma. At the request of our returning President, we are looking into doing a live service each month, as well as guest speakers and other educational opportunities. So, watch this space! Until then, watch the YouTube channel, and keep listening for the Dharma wherever you are.


#### YBA Hosts Safe Halloween Party




