#### **Celebrating Shinran's Birth**

Happy May everyone! We are in full swing of Spring! The rain is still falling and the sun visits on occasion! This year of 2023, and this month of May we are celebrating a momentous occasion: the 850<sup>th</sup> anniversary of our founder, Shinran Shonin's birth, and the founding of our sect of Jodo Shinshu. For this whole year our mother temple, Nishi Hongwanji, is having weeklong celebrations of special services to commemorate this auspicious time.

Shinran was born on May 21<sup>st</sup>, 1173 in Kyoto, Japan. His birth name was Matsuwakamaro, and was born into a branch of the Fujiwara clan. Not much is known about Shinran's childhood but there are many legends that surround his upbringing and his childhood.

We are also commemorating the establishment of the school of Jodo Shinshu! We are not the only pure land followers in Buddhism for sure, but it must be noted that the Jodo Shinshu sect of Buddhism is one of the largest. For me, this is because of the uniqueness of Shinran Shonin himself. His understanding of his master Honen's teachings has made Buddhism accessible to us, and has brought hope to those who normally could not benefit from the hard austere practices of traditional Buddhism.

It is important for us as members of the Jodo Shinshu tradition to offer our thanks to the many teachers back to Shakyamuni for gifting us this teaching. For through the working of the inconceivable vow, we have access and the benefits of the nembutsu teaching. In our daily lives we rush and do our best to get ahead. We, as ordinary beings, don't always see the reflection of our imperfect selves that might be causing harm, or intruding upon others.

Yet for this reason, Shakyamuni, the Seven Masters, and Shinran realized that there needed to be a teaching that was practical and unique to people who did not have the time to devote to many hours of hard practices. We are the ones who benefit from these teachings that are freely given to us from Amida's wisdom and compassion.

Let's all celebrate and give our thanks to Amida Buddha and to Shinran for the teachings that will liberate us from this world of samsara.

**Cooking class**. The temple occasionally offers cooking classes that allow participants to learn how to prepare traditional or Japanese-inspired dishes. These classes are not only a great opportunity to learn how to cook new dishes, but they also provide an opportunity to learn about the cultural and religious significance of the food. While most importantly at the end, sharing the freshly made meal with friends and family and making new friends in the process.

**Yoga for Compassion**. Yoga is growing fast in popularity and is often associated with physical and mental wellness. Be on the lookout to join Kara and other temple members as they start their weekend off strong with group yoga. No matter what your experience level is you are always welcome to join, and it is a great way to improve your physical health and mental well-being.

**Buddhism 101**. For those who are curious to learn more about Buddhism or want to deepen their understanding, we welcome you to our Buddhism 101 classes. 
